### Review of the circumstances surrounding the death of "O"

### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 This is a report of a Domestic Homicide Review (DHR) conducted under the terms of section 9 of the Domestic Violence, Crime & Victims Act 2004. It examines agency responses and support given to O, a resident of the London Borough of Hillingdon (LBH), prior to her death (*sic* at the hands of her adult son) in 2018.
- 1.2. With the support of the Chair of the Home Office's DHR Quality Assurance Panel and in accordance with the Home Office's Domestic Homicide Review, Statutory Guidance (December 2016), the only published elements of the report are:

### 17. Lessons to be learned

- 17.1 The principal lessons to learn from this case relate to the challenges of enabling older people suffering from abuse to disclose their needs to agencies. Those barriers are both cultural and situational. Overcoming the barriers will require better awareness, better information gathering and better targeting of the sensitive enquires which need to be made. Perhaps the key issue is that all staff must appreciate that opportunities to make such sensitive enquiries may be very limited and thus it is essential that staff are able to seize opportunities as and when they arise. In this particular case it is noteworthy that Age Concern staff at Hillingdon Hospital did attempt to exploit the opportunity to support O when they met her by chance at Hillingdon Hospital in May 2016 (see para. 13.8). Conversely, in February 2017 (see para. 13.12) when B was arrested at O's home, despite the fact that police officers referred the incident to the Triage Social Worker at ASC, the matter was not referred to (*sic* Domestic Abuse) MARAC, as it might have been whilst there can be no certainty that such a referral would have been productive, the chosen course (....) certainly did not result in protective action.
- 17.2 The inclusion of specific reference to the abuse of older people in the existing Domestic Abuse Strategy is the first step in addressing the challenges illustrated by this case (see Recommendation 1). The remaining recommendations are made with a view to implementation of the strategy to support and protect older people.

### 18. Recommendations

### **Recommendation 1**

Review the current Domestic Abuse Strategy and identify the abuse of older people as an explicit category of abuse within the overarching structure.

### **Recommendation 2**

Develop explicit measures in the strategy's implementation plan to monitor the development of arrangements to identify cases of the abuse of older people.

### **Recommendation 3**

Review links with voluntary and charitable organisations having contact with older people to ensure engagement with training and awareness programmes. Particular attention should be paid to religious/cultural/social community-based organisations.

### **Recommendation 4**

To ensure that the DA Champions' work programme includes training in identifying the signs, symptoms and 'red flags' of the abuse of older people, referral pathways, risk assessment and information relating to the available advocacy / support agencies.

### **Recommendation 5**

It is recommended that the DA Champions engage with relevant voluntary, religious, culturally and ethnically-based community groups to raise awareness of the abuse of older people and seek to broaden the range/network of such organisations that are cognisant of the availability of training and/or support.

### **Recommendation 6**

Review and consider adopting a One Front Door approach to encompass all forms of safeguarding, including the abuse of older people.

### **Recommendation 7**

In conjunction with the CCG and in consultation with appropriate Safer Hillingdon Partnership and DA Partnership organisations, develop and pilot a short "prompt aide memoire" for the use of health professionals when dealing with older people and their carers.

### **Recommendation 8**

Review the routine training/awareness programme for all staff of relevant agencies and charities to:

 Emphasise the importance of referrals to MASH/MARAC (via the "Single Front Door") in cases where any professional believes there is an increasing trajectory of risk to a vulnerable person, even though the immediate situation does not meet the formal referral criteria.
